Editors' Note from Andy Strohkirch

The way we define our culture, heritage and the way we develop our language is determined not only by the past and tranditions of our people, and by our physical area, but moreso it is defined by the individual perception of our environ-

ment, be it what we hear, see, experience or feel. A major influence on our development of these values is based and shaped by the behaviour and traditions of the people who accompany us through life and especially at the early stages, when we grow up.

As a result the bare definition of our culture and heritage may in some points substantially differ from the understanding of other generations, like e.g. our grandparents, parents, children or grandchildren. The "world", and with it our environment is constantly changing and evolving, and so is the impact on us, our education, opinions, deeds, our way of life, arts, and so on. With it comes a constant development and even change in language.

If we accept the impact of the different perceptual worlds between people as given fact, we need to be aware that the definition of culture and heritage of an



ethnic group is really a sum of the definitions of many individuals, and that we should strive to include the different characterizations between generations into our own definition of culture and heritage to gain a greater understanding of ourselves and our people.

When I take a brief look on today's community structures, and the offer these communities are holding for their people, I cannot but notice two developments which are worth a thought.

Many communities are segmented into different subgroups or -communities to address a distinct group of people within their cultural and ethnic group. Why did these groups build in the first place, and why is there no unity between groups? I think, this might underly upon the different definitions of culture and heritage our people carry.

The second development I noticed is that an often practiced conduct may be the almost overrepresented inclusion of ageold traditions into cultural groups and organizations, and in some circumstances the most likely accidental oblivion to include most modern aspects of culture into the mix. Culture, which is lived, maintained, or developed by our young generations. It could be a nice

thought that bestowing attention to these circumstances could bring unity to our people!

Our current task at hand, the preservation and celebration of our culture and heritage, is holding the wonderful opportunity to consider new ways of understanding our people, and the influence of our physical and temporal environments.

and culture as well.





A Brief History of International Mother Language Day

Ekushey - the 21st of February is a name of a movement, a name of the day of mourning, of a day of pride, of a day of reflection, and action, which advocates a greater socio-cultural cooperation among the nations of the world. A day that benefits cultural diversity of the world and creates a unique opportunity to celebrate different cultures, opposing to monoculture in the global arena. In Bangladesh the day is known as the Language Martyr's Day. Sixty three years ago on this day of February 21st among others, Salam, Barkat, Jabbar, Shafiur and Rafig, sacrificed their precious lives for the honor and protection of mother language, Bangla in Bangladesh.

At the initiative of the Bangladesh government, it was first announced by Paris-based United Nations Educational. Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) on November 17, 1999 adopting 21st February as International Mother Language Day. For the first time since

2000, 21st February has been observed as International Mother Language Day. The observance of the day formally recognized by the United Nations General Assembly in its resolution establishing 2008 as the International Year of Languages.

Ekushey - the 21st of February is a milestone in recognition of linguistic rights, those are also the human and civil rights concerning the individual and collective rights to choose the language or languages for communication in a private or public atmosphere. Other parameters for analyzing linguistic rights include the degree of territoriality, amount of positivity, orientation in terms of conservation, and obviousness.

Linguistic rights became more and more prominent throughout the course of history as language came to be increasingly seen as a part of nationhood.



Although policies and legislation involving language have been in effect in early European history, these were often cases where a language was being imposed upon people while other languages or dialects were neglected. Most of the initial literature on linguistic rights came from countries where linguistic and/or national divisions grounded in linguistic diversity have resulted in linguistic rights playing a vital role in maintaining stability. However, it was not until the 1900s that linguistic rights gained official status in politics and international accords.*

Before the making of Pakistan in 1947, there had been strong demands from an intellectual level that Bangla be made the state language of Pakistan. Dr. Muhammad Shahidullah, an eminent academic, suggested in July 1947 that, after the departure of the British from India, Bangla could be made as the state language of the new state.

Shortly after the creation of Pakistan, at the first session of the Pakistan Legislative Assembly Dhirendranath Datta's made it clear that Bangla should be made as the state language of Pakistan..

Dhirendranath Datta's speech on February 23, 1948 to the Pakistan Constituent Assembly in Karachi, presided over by Mohammad Ali Jinnah, was the first formal articulation of the demand for Bengali to be made one of the state languages of Pakistan. This culminated in the Language Movement of 1952 and the martyrdom of the Language Heroes. This movement is regarded by many as the first step towards the Liberation Movement leading to independence of Bangladesh in 1971. For this reason, Dhirendranath Datta's speech is regarded as one of the most important events in the history of East Pakistan and Bangladesh.

"Sir, in moving this — the motion that stands in my name — I can assure the House that I do so not in a spirit of narrow Provincialism, but, Sir, in the spirit that this motion receives the fullest consideration at the hands of members.

I know, Sir, that Bengali is a provincial language, but, so far our state is concerned, it is the language of the majority of the people of the state. So although it is a provincial language, as a language of the majority of the people of the state it stands on a different footing. Out of six crores and ninety lakhs [69 million] of people of people inhabiting this State, 4 crores and 40 lakhs



44 million of people speak the Bengali language. So, Sir, what should be the State language of the State of Pakistan? The State language of the State should be the language which is used by the majority of the people of the State, and for that, Sir, I consider that Bengali language is a lingua franca of our State.

It may be contended with a certain amount of force that even in our sister dominion the provincial language have not got the status of a lingua franca because in her sister dominion of India the proceedings of the Constituent Assembly is conducted in Hindustani, Hindi or Urdu or English. It is not conducted in the Bengali language but so far as the Bengali is concerned out of 30 cores of people inhabiting that sister dominion two and a half crores speak the Bengali language. Hindustani, Hindi or Urdu has been given an honoured place in the sister dominion because the majority of the people of the Indian Dominion speak that language.

So we are to consider that in our state it is found that the majority of the people of the Indian Dominion speak that language. So we are to consider that in our State it is found that the majority of the people of the State do speak the Bengali language then Bengali should have an honored place even in the Central Government."

[The Pakistan government never forgot Dhirendranath's continued rebelliousness of state insight and dictatorship. At the beginning of the Bangladesh Liberation War, he was arrested from his Comilla house on 29 March 1971, three days after the arrest of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman, and taken with his son, Dilip Kumar Datta, to Comilla Moynamoti Cantonment and tortured to death. He is also often referred to as "Shaheed" (martyr) as a sign of respect]

Chronology of Language Movement

September 15, 1947:

Tamuddun Majlis (cultural society, an organization by scholars, writers and journalists) demanded Bengali as one of the state languages of Pakistan.

November 1947:

Educator Fazlur Rahman opposed Urdu as the only national language in the Pakistan Education Conference.

February 23, 1948:

Dhirendra Nath Dutta, a Bengali opposition member, moves a resolution in the first session of Pakistan's Constituent Assembly for recognizing Bengali as a state language along with Urdu and English.



March 1948:

A committee of action of the students of Dhaka University is set up with the objective of achieving national status of Bengali.

March 21, 1948:

Mohammad Ali Jinnah, the founder of Pakistan and its first Governor General, declares in Dhaka University convocation that "The State language of Pakistan is going to be Urdu and no other language. Anyone who tries to mislead you is really an enemy of Pakistan." This remark evoked an angry protest from Bengali youth.

January 26, 1952:

In a public meeting at Paltan Maidan (Paltan Field), Dhaka, Prime Minister Nazimuddin declares that Urdu alone will be the state language of Pakistan.

January 31, 1952:

A broad-based All-Party Committee of Action (APCA) is constituted with Kazi Golam Mahboob as Convener and Maulana Bhashani as Chairman, and with two representatives.

February 3, 1952:

In a protest meeting, the committee of action decided to hold a general strike on 21 February.

February 20, 1952:

An order was promulgated under Section 144 of the Criminal Procedure Code prohibiting processions and meetings in Dhaka City.

February 21, 1952:

The students of Dhaka University decided to defy the official ban in a meeting and decided to protest in peaceful procession. The police opened fire on students in front of the Medical College Hostel. Mohammad Salauddin, Abdul Jabbar, Abul Barkat, Rafiquddin Ahmed, Abdus Salam were among those who became martyrs.

May 7, 1954:

The Pakistan government recognizes Bengal as a state language.

Nov 17, 1999:

UNESCO proclaimed 21 Feb as International Mother Language Day. It is an honor bestowed by the international community on the language movement of Bangladesh.

Until 2000, the celebration of the mother language day was limited to Bangladesh and Bangla speaking peoples around the world. With the proclamation of the day as the International Mother Language Day by the United Nations in 1999, the day has been given its due universal height and it has become a pride of Bangladesh. The essence of the Ekushey will always give us inspiration to forge ahead as a self-governing nation that refuses to obeisance its head to unholy and diabolical powers trying to suppress identity of a nation.

The idea of the day came from a BC, Canada based Organization named "Mother Language Lovers of the World". Including Bengali, English, Kutchi, Cantonese, German, Filipino, and Hindi language speaking members are in that organization. In 1999 they urged the UNO and the UNESCO to declare 21st February as the International Mother Language Day. The UNESCO in reply informed them that such proposal could only be considered if it had come from the National Commission for UNESCO by any member-state. The said organization immediate after informed The Ministry of Education of Bangladesh over telephone and as a result the then government sent a Proposal to UNESCO from Bangladesh maintaining all the procedural formalities and after necessary review UNESCO has adopted the historic resolution.

Through the recognition International Mother Language Day has opened linguistic and cultural rights for all speakers of all languages all over the world now it caught the eyes of the world, and created an opportunity to explore Bangladeshi history and culture. The sacrifices made by Rafiqul Islam and his team from Mother Language Lovers of the World and the then Bangladeshi Ambassador to France Syed Muazzem Ali, Dr Sadat Hossain, Education Minister ASHK Sadek, Dr Sayedur Rahman Khan, High Commission for the People's Republic of Bangladesh, London, who was then the VC of Rajshahi University and many other individuals and organizations. The efforts and dedication contributed a lot towards the recognition of this day.



The Bangladesh Liberation War was rooted to the language movement of Bangladesh, Ethnic and linguistic discrimination was a key factor in the rise of Bengali nationalist sentiment that led by Bangabandhu Sheikh Muzibur Rahman. Language controversy, disparities, political differences, poor response to the humanitarian concern and a planned military action carried out by Army curbed the movement into a war

of Independance.

The Message for the International Mother Language Day is to join forces to promote linguistic diversity and promote multilingualism by the all nations of the world to build a terror free society and a life of dignity for all.

প্রবাসে বাংলা ভাষা ও সংস্কৃতি চর্চা -শেখ জলিল

একটি দেশের সংস্কৃতি সেই দেশের সামগ্রিক জীবনচর্চারই প্রতিচ্ছবি। জাতির ইতিহাস, ঐতিহ্য, মানুষের জীবনধারা, তাদের সাহিত্য, সংস্কৃতি, দর্শন, ধ্যান-ধারনা, তাদের সুখ-দুঃখ, আশা-আকাঙ্ক্ষা, মন-মানসিকতা-- এক কথায় সমগ্রা সমাজ জীবনের চেহারা একটি পরিশুদ্ধ আয়নায় প্রতিফলিত হয়ে ওঠে। সংস্কৃতি কি? ইংরেজি শব্দ কালচার(ঈষঃংব)-এর প্রতিশব্দ হলো সংস্কৃতি। সংস্কৃতি হলো ঐতিহ্যেরই ঐতিাসিক ও ধারাবাহিক রূপ। পরিশীলিত ও পরিশুদ্ধ জীবন চেতনাই সংস্কৃতি। অন্যদিকে সংস্কৃতির মূলকথা হলো- ব্যক্তিসত্তা ও জনসন্তার প্রাণময় ও গতিময় বিকাশ সাধন। আর এ কারণেই বলা হয়েছে- মানুষ হিসেবে মানুষের আসল পরিচয় পরিচয়ই সংস্কৃতি।

আমাদের মাতৃভাষা বাংলার ইতিহাস ও ঐতিহ্য হাজার বছরের বেশি পুরনো। খ্রিস্টীয় প্রথম সহস্রান্দের শেষ প্রান্তে এসে মধ্য ভারতীয় আর্য ভাষাগুলোর বিভিন্ন অপভ্রংশ থেকে যে আধুনিক ভারতীয় ভাষাগুলোর উদ্ভব ঘটে, তাদের মধ্যে বাংলা একটি। কোন কোন ভাষাবিদ তারও অনেক আগে, ৫০০ খ্রিস্টান্দের দিকে, বাংলার জন্ম হয় বলে মত পোষণ করেন। তবে এ ভাষাটি তখন পর্যন্ত কোন সৃস্থির রূপ ধারণ করেনি; সে সময় এর বিভিন্ন লিখিত ও ঔপভাষিক রূপ পাশাপাশি বিদ্যমান ছিল। যেমন, ধারণা করা হয় ৬ষ্ঠ শতান্দীর দিকে মাগধি

অপত্রংশ থেকে মাগধি অবহট্ঠের উদ্ভব ঘটে। এই অবহট্ঠ ও বাংলা কিছু সময় ধরে সহাবস্থান করছিল। বাংলা ভাষার ইতিহাসকে সাধারণত তিন ভাগে ভাগ করা হয়:

প্রাচীন বাংলা (৯০০/১০০০ খ্রিস্টাব্দ- ১৪০০ খ্রিস্টাব্দ) লিখিত নিদর্শনের মধ্যে আছে চর্যাপদ, ভক্তিমূলক গান; আমি, তুমি, ইত্যাদি সর্বনামের আবির্ভাব; ক্রিয়াবিভক্তি -ইলা, -ইবা, ইত্যাদি। ওডিয়া ও অসমীয়া এই পর্বে বাংলা থেকে আলাদা হয়ে যায়।



মধ্য বাংলা (১৪০০- ১৮০০ খ্রিস্টাব্দ) এ সময়কার গুরুত্বপূর্ণ লিখিত নিদর্শন চণ্ডীদাসের শ্রীকৃষ্ণকীর্তন; শব্দের শেষে "অ" ধ্বনির বিলোপ; যৌগিক ক্রিয়ার প্রচলন; ফার্সি প্রভাব। কোন কোন ভাষাবিদ এই যুগকে আদি ও অক্ত্য এই দুই ভাগে ভাগ করেন।

আধুনিক বাংলা (১৮০০ খ্রিস্টাব্দ থেকে) ক্রিয়া ও সর্বনামের সংক্ষেপন (যেমন তাহার ? তার; করিয়াছিল ? করেছিল)।

সপ্তম শতাব্দীতে লিখিত 'চর্যাপদ' বাংলা ভাষার সবচেয়ে প্রাচীনতম নিদর্শন হিসেবে স্বীকৃত। মধ্যযুগে বাংলা ভাষার মূল উপজীব্য ছিলো কাব্য, লোকগীতি ও পালাগান। উনবিংশ ও বিংশ শতাব্দীতে এসে বাংলা কাব্য ও গদ্যরীতির ব্যাপক উৎকর্ষ সাধিত হয়। নোবেলজয়ী বিশ্বকবি 'রবীন্দ্রনাথ ঠাকুর' ও আমাদের জাতীয় কবি 'কাজী নজক্রল ইসলাম' বাংলা ভাষার উনুয়নে ব্যাপক ভূমিকা রাখেন। বাংলাদেশের লোকগীতির ভাগ্তারও বিশাল। বিশেষ করে 'মৈমনসিংহ গীতিকা'র নাম এক্ষেত্রে উলেখযোগ্য।

আজকের পৃথিবীতে চতুর্থ ভাষা হিসেবে চর্চিত কিংবা উচ্চারিত হয়ে এক উঁচু আসনে আছে আমাদের মাতৃভাষা। বীরত্ব আর সাহসের প্রতীক এই ভাষা আজ উচ্চারিত পৃথিবীর দেশে দেশে অর্ধকোটি বাঙ্ডালির মুখে মুখে। ব্রিটেনের অর্ধমিলিয়ন বাঙ্ডালিসহ ইউরোপ-আমেরিকায় অভিবাসিত বাঙ্ডালিদের পরবর্তী প্রজন্মের কাছে এ ভাষা আদৌ উচ্চারিত হবে কি হবে না এপ্রশ্ন এখন আমাদের ভাবায়। যতই সময় গড়াচ্ছে, ততই যেন শেকড়মুখী হওয়ার প্রবণতা কমছে বৈ বাড়ছে না। আর তাই শেকড়ের সন্ধানে থাকা এই সময়ের মানুষদের অর্থাৎ আমাদেরই ভাবতে হবে। সংগ্রামের ইতিহাস আর ঐতিহ্যকে সময়োপযোগী করেই রাখতে হবে, তথ্য সাম্রাজ্যে নিজেকে বিস্তৃত করতে হবে। তবেই না গবের ইতিহাস উচ্চারিত হবে যুগ থেকে যুগান্তরে, প্রজন্ম থেকে প্রজন্মার্ভরে।

বাঙালি মাতৃভাষাগত প্রাণ। ভাষার জন্য রক্ত দেয়া জাতি আর

আছে কিনা আমার জানা নেই। বাঙালি জাতির পরিচয়টাও মূলতঃ ভাষার কারনে, রক্তের মিলের কারণে নয়। অনেক জাতির লোকেরাই বিভিন্ন উপলক্ষে বাংলায় এসে বসতি স্থাপন করে। আস্তে আস্তে তারা এখানকার ভাষা ব্যবহার করতে করতে বাঙালি হয়ে গিয়েছেন। এজন্য বাঙালিরা বিভিন্ন রক্তের, রঙের, আকৃতির এবং উচ্চতার। তথুই ভাষাতেই একতা। তাই এ ভাষার প্রতি তাদের বিরাট ভালবাসা। বাঙালিরা যেখানেই থাকেন না কেন ভাষার প্রতি দরদ তাদের সবসময়ই থাকে। যারা বিদেশে স্থায়ীভাবে বসবাস করার জন্য চলে এসেছেন তারাও চান মাতৃভাষার নিয়মিত চর্চা করতে। তারা চান তাদের সন্তানরাও যারা অনেকেই বাংলাদেশের নাগরিক নয় বাংলা শিখুক। কিন্তু বিদেশে সম্ভানদের বাংলা শেখাতে গিয়ে তারা পড়েন বিরাট চ্যালেঞ্জের মুখোমুখি। এ ক্ষেত্রে যে বিষয়গুলো গুরুত্বপূর্ণ সেগুলো হলঃ বাংলার আঞ্চলিক ভাষার বিভিন্নতা, অনেক প্রবাসী বাঙালির বাংলা সম্পর্কে যথার্থ জ্ঞানের অভাব. বাংলা শিখানোর প্রতিষ্ঠানের অভাব, আর সর্বোপরি পরিবেশের প্রভাব।

ভাষা শেখার সবচেয়ে ভাল সময় হচ্ছে জীবনের প্রথম ক'টি বছর। এ কথা আমার নিজের নয়, বরং ভাষাতাত্ত্বিক ও শিক্ষাবিদদের কথা। ভাষাবিদরা তাদের গবেষণার মাধ্যমে প্রমাণ করেছেন যে, শিশুরা বেশ ক'টি ভাষা একই সাথে শিখতে পারে যদি তাদের বুদ্ধিবৃত্তিক মতা স্বাভাবিক থাকে (বার্কো গিডসন, ২০০৫)। কিন্তু সেজন্য প্রথমেই প্রয়োজন মাতৃভাষার উপর দক্ষতা। কিন্ডারগার্টেন শুরু করার আগেই শিশুরা যদি তাদের মাতৃভাষায় দক্ষতা অর্জন করতে পারে ও অনর্গল বলতে পারে, তাহলে তার পাশাপাশি অন্য ভাষা শেখাও তাদের জন্য অনেক সহজ হয়ে যায়। ছেলেমেয়েদের বয়স যতো বাড়তে থাকে তাদের পক্ষে অন্য ভাষা শেখা তত কঠিন হতে থাকে। অনেক অভিভাবকরা ভাবেন, বাংলা শিখলে তাদের ছেলেমেয়েরা ইংরেজী বা বিদেশী ভাষায় পারদর্শী হতে পারবে না। তারা যে গুধু ভুল করছেন তাই না. বরং তারা নিজ হাতে ছেলেমেয়েদের একাধিক ভাষা শেখার সুযোগকে একেবারেই বন্ধ করে দিচ্ছেন। তাই ভাষার ব্যাপারে



বাবা–মায়ের সচেতনতার খুব প্রয়োজন। ভাষা শেখার জন্য স্কুলের প্রয়োজন আছে, কিন্তু তাকে এগিয়ে নিতে হলে দরকার বাবা–মা ও পরিবারের সবার একান্ত অংশগ্রহণ।

বাংলা ভাষা শেখার জন্য অনেকেই বাংলা স্কুলে আসেন।
তাদের বাংলা শেখার চেষ্টাকে আরও অর্থবহ করে তুলতে হলে
ভাষা শিক্ষার জন্য প্রযুক্তি ও প্রচার মাধ্যমের ব্যবহার করতে
হবে। বাংলা শিখতে হলে বাংলা চর্চার আবহ তৈরী করতে
হবে। বাংলা বলুন। বাইরেও ছেলেমেয়েদের সাথে
বাংলায় কথা বলুন। বাঙালি আত্মীয়-স্বজন ও
বন্ধু-বান্ধবদেরকেও বাংলায় কথা বলতে অনুপ্রাণিত করুন।
বাংলা নাটক ও ছোটদের অনুষ্ঠান দেখতে দিন এবং তাদের
সাথে যোগ দিয়ে অনুষ্ঠান উপভোগ করুন। ভাষা শেখার জন্য
ফনোলজিকাল এওয়্যারনেস তৈরী করতে একটি সমন্বিত
কর্মসূচী দরকার। এতে সবার অংশগ্রহণ দরকার। যারা কানাজা
ও আমেরিকায় বড়ো হচ্ছে তারা ইংরেজী শিখবে খুব সহজে,
কিন্তু তাদেরকে বাংলা শেখানো অনেক কঠিন হবে যদি না
আমরা সবাই মিলে অংশগ্রহণ না করি।

সম্ভানদের বাংলা শেখানোর ক্ষেত্রে অন্য আরেকটি সমস্যা হলো
অধিকাংশ পিতামাতার নিজেদেরই বাংলা সম্পর্কে অজ্ঞতা।
কিছু এলাকার লোক আছেন যারা মনে করেন তাদের ভাষাটাই
বাংলা থেকে আলাদা। ফলে তারা বাংলা শেখানোর পরিবর্তে
ছেলেমেয়েদের তাদের নিজস্ব আঞ্চলিক ভাষাই শুধু শেখান।
তাদের মতে তাদের অঞ্চলের ভাষা এক আর সারা
বাংলাদেশের ভাষা অন্য আরেকটি। ফলে তারা নিজেদেরকে
বাঙালিই ভাবেন না। সুতরাং শুদ্ধ বাংলা শেখানোর কোন
প্রয়োজনীয়তা তারা উপলব্ধি করেন না।

সবচেয়ে বড় যে বিষয়টি প্রবাসীদের ছেলেমেয়েদের মাতৃভাষা চর্চার পেছনে অন্তরায় হয়ে দাঁড়ায় তা হলো পরিবেশ। অনেক বাচ্চারা কথা বলতে শুরু করে সুন্দর বাংলা দিয়ে, কিন্তু একটু বড় হলেই আর ওরা বাংলা বলতে চায় না এবং এতে অনভ্যস্থ হয়ে পড়ে। এ সমস্যাটা সবচেয়ে বেশী প্রকট হয়ে পড়ে যখন তারা স্কুলে যেতে শুরু করে। স্কুলের ভাষা, যা অধিকাংশ ক্ষেত্রেই ইংরেজী, বলেই বাচ্চারা সাচ্ছন্দ্যবোধ করে। তাদের বন্ধু এবং শিক্ষক-শিক্ষিকাদের সাথে ঐ ভাষায় কথা বলতে তারা এত বেশী অভ্যস্থ হয়ে পড়ে যে তারা আর কোনভাবেই বাংলা বলতে পারে না। বরং বাংলা বলতে জাের করার মানে হয় তাদেরকে আ্যাবে নিক্ষেপ করার মত।

কিছু কিছু অভিভাবক আছেন যারা বাংলা শেখা বা বলার জন্য সম্ভানদের কোন পরিবেশই দেন না। তাঁরা তাদের সন্ভানদের মাতৃভাষাই বানিয়ে দেন ইংরেজী। কারন তাদের বাচ্চারা কথা বলতে শুরু করলেই তাঁরা তাদের সাথে ইংরেজীতে কথা বলা পছন্দ করেন, যদিও বাচ্চারা বড় হয়ে তাদের বাবা-মায়ের ইংরেজী উচ্চারণ নিয়ে হাসাহাসি করতেও দ্বিধা করে না। এশ্রেণীর অভিভাবকরা বুঝেন না যে এখানকার বাচ্চারা স্বয়ংক্রিয়ভাবেই ইংরেজী শিখবে। ইংরেজী তাদেরকে বলে শেখাতে হবে না; বরং তাদের যা বলে শিখিয়ে অভ্যেস করাতে হবে তা হলো মাতৃভাষা।

প্রকৃত ব্যাপার হল বিদেশে সম্ভানদের বাংলা শেখানো অত্যন্ত কঠিন একটি বিষয়। তবে আন্তরিকতা এবং নিষ্ঠা থাকলে এবং যথাযথ পদক্ষেপ নিলে সন্ভানদের মোটামুটি চলনসই বাংলা শেখানো সম্ভব। এক্ষেত্রে পিতামাতাকে সচেতনভাবে পারিবারিক পরিবেশে বাংলার চর্চা করতে হবে। আঞ্চলিকতা বাদ দিয়ে শুদ্ধ চলিত বাংলায় সন্ভানদের সাথে ঘরে নিয়মিত কথা বললে তারা তখন অন্য বাঙালি ছেলেমেয়েদের সাথে বাংলা কথা বলার সমস্যায় পড়বে না। ফলে বাংলা বলতে তারা উৎসাহিত হবে। নাহলে তারা বাঙালিদের ভাষার বিভিন্নতা দেখে এ ভাষা বলা থেকে বিরত থাকবে।

বাংলা ভাষা শেখার সুযোগ দিন দিন বাড়ছে। এজন্য বাবা-মায়েরা কম্পিউটার ও ওয়েববগ ব্যবহার করতে পারেন। ইদানীং বাংলা বগ তৈরী করার খুব সহজ ব্যবস্থা হয়েছে, এ ব্যাপারে বিভিন্ন বাংলা বগ ব্যবহার করা যেতে পারে। শিশুদের বিনোদনের জন্য উপযোগী বাংলা বগ তৈরী করতে হবে যাতে



ছেলে-মেয়েরা উপযোগী বিনোদনমূলক গল্প-ছড়া হাতের নাগালে সবসময়ই পেতে পারে। এধরণের ব্যবস্থা সহায়ক রিডিং রিসোর্স তৈরী করবে যা সহজে অভিভাবকরা ব্যবহার করতে পারবেন। মনে রাখতে হবে, বাংলাদেশ আর বাংলা আমাদের ভাবনায় ও চর্চায় অবিচ্ছেদ্য। তাহলেই হবে বাংলা চর্চা সার্থক এই সুদূর প্রবাসে।

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
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Implementation of International Mother Language Day in Canada

International Mother Language Day has been introduced to the Canadian Parliament for recognition by Mr. Matthew Kellway on February 5, 2014. The introduction has been made in form of a Private Member's Bill, Bill C-573, the International Mother Language Day Act.

The recognition of International Mother Language Day for all Canadian provinces could make a statement for the commitment to linguistic diversity and preservation. Canada is home of over 60 individual First Nations languages [Census 2011], and the trend of declining languages can also be seen in Canada. Statistics Canada found in a national household survey in 2011, that only 17.2% of the population with an aboriginal identity responded to be able to conduct a conversation in an Aboriginal language. Further Canada is home to languages spoken all over the world.



At that time five members volunteered to form an Executive Committee, whose purpose was to organize socio-cultural activities within the community. Currently, large number of Bangladeshi students are associated with BSAUA and celebrate International Mother Language Day every year.

Over the past fourteen years, a number of countries like Bangladesh, Maledives, Federal Republic of Yugoslavia, Hungary, Romania, Serbia and Slovak, Morocco, France, Canada, Spain, United States of America, Mexico, South Africa, Congo, Russia, Malaysia and Australia have been celebrating International Mother Language Day.

A number of debates, special events and forums have been organized at local, national, regional and international level. Since 2000, there are significant initiatives taken by the ministry of culture and other respective departments to advance the evolution of mother tongue languages, and the promotion of tolerance and to show respect towards the languages of other populations. 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


21st February: International Mother Language Day

UNESCO's declaration of 21st February as the International Mother Language Day has brought fresh glory and prestige to Bangladesh which is making significant strides towards peace, progress and prosperity at home and discharging international obligations abroad. After 1952, the people of Bangladesh have been observing every year the 21st day of February as their glorious and unforgettable Language Martyrs Day. What happened on 21st February 1952 is widely known. Still let me very briefly recount the fateful happenings of that day and the circumstances that led to and followed them.

In August 1947, a new state called Pakistan, comprising two far-flung wings in the west and east, separated by 1600 kilometers of foreign territory, emerged on the world map. The ideological basis of that strange phenomenon was the absurd and pernicious two nation theory of Mr. Jinnah that ignored such basic

elements as language and culture and considered religion as a bond strong and sufficient enough to transform a people into a nation.

The language of the people of eastern wing of Pakistan, and they were the majority, was Bangla. It had a rich tradition of literature of over a thousand



years. The Bangalees also had a highly developed culture that had little in common with the culture of the people of western wing of Pakistan. The Bangalees' love for and attachment to their language and culture were great and when in 1952 the neo-colonial, power-hungry, arrogant rulers of Pakistan declared that 'Urdu and Urdu alone would be the state language of Pakistan, they sowed the seed of its future disintegration.

The people of the then East Pakistan, particularly the students, rose in angry protest against the vicious undemocratic designs of the government. Those designs really amounted to the destruction of Bangla language and culture and imposition of the language and culture of the people of western wing on the people of eastern wing. The reaction was strong and spontaneous.

The government decided to quell protests by brute force. The police opened fire on 21st February 1952 on unarmed peaceful protesters, most of whom were students, resulting in the death, among others, of Rafiq, Barkat, Jabbar and Salam. As the news of those deaths spread, the entire people of the eastern wing felt greatly involved emotionally. Those who lost their lives to uphold the

prestige defend the rights of their mother-language became hallowed martyrs.

Their sacrifice at once tragic glorious and the indignation of the people against an autocratic government had far reaching effect. 21st February became a symbol and attained mythic properties, it nourished the concepts of democracy and secularism. It also contributed significantly to the flowering of Bangalee nationalism. It led to the dawning of the realization in the minds of the Bangalees that they constituted a separate nation and their destiny lay not with Pakistan but elsewhere as an independent country. The subsequent democratic mass movements of the late fifties, throughout the sixties and the seventies, and finally the struggle for independence and the war of liberation owed a great deal to 21st February.

From 1953 onwards, starting from 21st February 1953, the immortal 21st February has been observed as a great national event all over Bangladesh, and also beyond the frontiers of Bangladesh: in several places of India, UK, USA, Canada and elsewhere, wherever there is a sizeable concentration of Bangla speaking people. Yet so long, it has been mainly a national event of Bangladesh.



But with the declaration of 21st February as the International Mother Language Day, it has transcended the national borders of Bangladesh and acquired an international significance and a global dimension.

At the initiative of the United Nations and its various organs, a number of specific days have been declared over the years as international days for observance by the people of the whole world. All these days highlight some values, events and issues and are intended to generate a healthy awareness in the people of the world about them with the ultimate aim of making this world a better place to live in for the entire human population. Thus we have the international literacy day, international women's day, international children's day, the international day for eradication of racial discrimination, international day for ensuring pure drinking water, inter-



national habitat day, international day for preservation of environment and many others.

Some of these international days are linked with certain specific events that took place in some specific countries. While observing these days, the people of the world recall those events and those countries as a matter of course. The world is thus brought closer providing peoples of the world with the chance to get out of their insularity.

International Mother Language Day is particularly significant in the sense that it has a cultural importance. From now on, 21st February — so long observed in Bangladesh as the Bangla Language Martyrs' Day — will be observed here simultaneously as the Bangla Language Martyrs' Day and the International Mother Language Day. And in nearly 200 countries of the world, various peoples speaking various languages and belonging to various national cultures will observe 21st February as the International Mother Language Day. They will naturally celebrate their own mother languages, but while doing so, it is more than likely that they will refer to Bangladesh and the Language Movement launched by her people that reached a climactic point on 21st February 1952.



The declaration made by the UNESCO in November 1999 designating 21st February as the International Mother Language Day has placed Bangladesh on the cultural map of the world with a highly positive image. We, people of Bangladesh, should now do all that we can to further develop our mother language Bangla in all branches of knowledge so that it can play a worthy role in the community of world languages. We shall love, cherish and promote Bangla, our own mother language, but we shall not indulged in any kind of chauvinism.

While devotedly serving our own language, we shall respect the languages of all the peoples of the world make 21st February - The International Mother

Language Day - a great day, to be observed worldwide in the new century and the millennium that we have recently stepped into. Long live 21st February the International Mother Language Day!

The Loss of Languages and why Mother Language is important

The term mother language can have different meanings by definition. Sometimes it is used alongside mother tongue, to address the language that a person learned from birth and that is passed on from generation to generation. Mother language is that language you are given by your mother. Sometimes, e.g. in a bilingual home, that can be more than one language.

You also may hear or read the terms first language and native language used in connection, but in our understanding there is a slight difference in the meaning.

First language is the language one choses to speak frequently or first, especially if that person has knowledge of more than one language. Oftentimes the first language is part of personal, social and cultural identity. Native language on the other hand may be understood as the language bound to the geographic

region the speaker of that language is residing, and also bound to the ethnic group the speaker is belonging to. Oftentimes the native language is set equal to first language e.g. in the use on CV's (curriculum vitae).

Did you know that our civilization currently has to offer more than 7,000 living languages worldwide, from which the most widely spoken languages are Mandarin Chinese, Spanish, English, Hindi, Arabic and Portuguese? An interesting fact is about 1.2 billion people in 33 countries use Mandarin Chinese as first language, and in comparison about 335 million people in 99 countries use English.*

Why is mother language important?

We all have at least one mother language, a language that has been passed on to us since birth. It is the first language we have learned to express ourselves and gained experiences and knowledge. Languages carry a vast repository of knowledge, information about the natural world around us like plants, animals, ecosystems, and information of cultural traditions and the collective history of an entire people. When a language is lost, much of this knowledge may get lost with it.

In language education research has shown that skills, that have been acquired in the mother tongue can be transferred to another language. Per example learning to read provides a base of knowledge of the world that can be applied to foreign language texts and make them more comprehensive to understand. As a result learning a second language will be accomplished more quickly and effectively when the student is proficient in his or her mother tongue.

Mother language gives us the ability to communicate with our ethnic group in a more distinct and subtile way. It allows us to transport feelings, expressions, experiences and thoughts more clearly, though language itself is never unequivocal.

We are losing languages around the world!

Around the world there are an estimated 7,100 languages that are being spoken. It has been observed, that the diversity of languages is decreasing and that this trend will continue during the next years and decades, a loss of valuable heritage and information for our civilization.

According to the US based organization Ethnologue, who are holding a global database of languages, about 21% of all languages are considered as "threatened". An additional 915 languages are currently considered "dying", which means that the young generations are no longer able to speak these languages fluently. The database dates back until 1950, and since then 373 languages haven been extinct [Nov. 2014], which means that not a single person has retained a sense of ethnic identity with these languages.

What is language loss?
The loss of a language can happen on two different levels. Language or parts of



the language can become forgotton by the speakers when the linguistic environment is changing, per example through immigration into a different country. Language can also be forgotton when its use becomes less relevant, per example through globalisation of language.

A language loss results in a loss of information, e.g. information about the native environment and local historic events. Expressions, e.g. for humour, love and life may differ, especially for languages from societies outside of the modern industrialized world. When a language gets lost, a cultural heritage gets lost with it.

The problem of losing lingual diversity is complex, because language and culture evolves and is amoung others shaped by progress, inventions, changes in behaviour, and the simplification of communication.

What can be done to prevent further loss of languages?

Many specialists and people working in the field have noted that our linguistic diversity is threatened by the loss of languages. To fight the problem, a number of promising projects have emerged; projects that document, revitalize and maintain languages, both in remote areas and in urban environments.

As a great local example, the Department of Canadian Heritage has created the Aboriginal Languages Initiative (ALI), which has the objective to support the preservation and revitalization of Aboriginal languages for the benefit of Aboriginal peoples and other Canadians. The program supports and funds projects and activities that support the preservation and revitalization of Aboriginal languages and cultures.

Another interesting development is the Endangered Language Alliance (ELA) in New York City. It is unique in the way, that it focuses on the linguistic diversity of urban areas, languages which have been brought into the area through immigration, and that are threatened by lack of education or speaking opportunities.

On the contrary National Geographic is maintaing a project called Enduring Voices, which strives to document the most endangered languages on our planet. The documentation takes place through audio (and video) recordings, which are compiled to talking dictionaries. Subject are languages spoken in remote areas all over the globe, which are threatened to die by lack of native speakers.







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
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


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
